Worsening COVID-19 Situation Forces PPSB to Enact Mask Mandate for Upcoming School Year

In response to the recent rise of new Covid-19 cases, superintendent of the Plaquemines Parish school system Denis Rousselle sent out a letter on July 26, 2021 outlining new precautions that will be implemented for the 2021-2022 school year.

According to that letter, all Plaquemines Parish School Board employees and students (Head Start through 12th grade) will be required to wear masks while indoors and on school buses. The number of visitors at schools will be limited, and they will also be required to wear masks. Additionally, before a parent or guardian must "complete a daily health screening." If that student has Covid-19 symptoms, they must remain at home.

Those who have been exposed to an individual who has tested positive for Covid-19 must follow the Center for Disease Control's and Louisiana Department of Health's guidelines: close contacts who were confirmed previously diagnosed with Covid-19 within the last 90 days and remain asymptomatic do not need to quarantine; close contacts who are confirmed fully vaccinated (i.e., 2 weeks following receipt of the second dose in a 2-dose series, or 2 weeks follow-

a student is sent to school, ing receipt of one dose in a single-dose vaccine) at the time of exposure and remain asymptomatic do not need to quarantine. All others who have been in close contact with Covid-19 must quarantine themselves before returning to school.

Currently, masks are only strongly recommended by state government officials; no mask mandate has been re-established. Even so, Rousselle felt putting a mask mandate for PPSB schools was the responsible thing to do at this

Louisiana has seen a massive uptick in new cases recently. From July 3 through July 5, there were no new recorded cases of Covid-19 in Louisiana. That number steadily grew throughout the month of July, peaking at 7,592 new cases on July 26, the highest number of new cases Louisiana has recorded in a single day.

"I don't think it's helpful to just recommend masks. That's not really a solution in my view. People need to know if we're going to wear masks or we aren't. And I've decided that it's important we wear masks," Rousselle said. "Right now, the [Covid-19] situation is out of control. We'll continue to monitor the situation, but, as it stands, not mandating masks would needlessly put the kids in harm's way."
