TC Energy Funds Habitat Enhancement at Woodlands Preserve

Thanks to a generous donation of \$45,000 received from TC Energy on September 1, 2023, you will start to see a lot more assessment and restoration activity underway at Woodlands Preserve beginning this fall. "TC Energy became one of Woodlands Conservancy's partners in 2022 and continues to invest in restoring our forested wetlands," said Katie Brasted, Woodlands Conservancy.
Woodlands Preserve has experienced a major loss of forest

canopy as a result of both fallen trees from hurricane activity in combination with those resulting from successful herbicide treatment of non-native vegetation. The downed trees in combination with a proliferation of briars has made it challenging to reforest with native trees and understory plants. Funding from TC Energy will help prepare open canopy areas of the forest and reforest with native seedlings and trees this coming winter. "We at TC Energy," said Charles Hearne, Social Impact Advisor at TC Energy, "are firm supporters of doing what we can to improve the quality of our forests for the benefits they provide to wildlife and the community at large."

"The permanently protected Woodlands Preserve proper-

ty is capable of absorbing 32 million gallons of water annually which serves to reduce flooding in the surrounding com-munity." said Brasted. "Moreover, that water is transpired slowly back into the atmosphere, keeping our temperatures lower – something I think we all can appreciate this summer." A healthy forested wetland provides habitat to native wildlife and "stopover" habitat for the thousands of neotropical migratory birds that depend on the site during spring and fall migration. Bird surveys beginning in 2004 and continuing on a monthly basis have documented over 160 bird species utilizing Woodlands Conservancy's properties including species of Greatest Conservation Need.
